It's an annual celebration of African-American culture from the 26th of December to the 1st of January culminating in a communal feast called Thanksgiving, celebrating our differences and what were thankful for. **The principles of Kwanzaa are: Umoja (unity)**, **Kujichagulia (self-determination)**, **Ujima (collective work and responsibility)**, **Ujamaa (cooperative economics)**, **Nia (purpose)**, **Kuumba (creativity) and Imani (faith)**.

Hanukkah starts on December 25th and ends on January 2nd. It is a Jewish celebration, revolving around the kindling of a nine-branched menorah, known in Hebrew as the hanukiah. On each of the holiday's eight nights, another candle is added to the menorah after sundown; the ninth candle, called the shamash ("helper"), is used to light the others.

A lot of issues affect 16 and 17 year olds, such as the cost of living (the price of living essentials) university and college funding and employment. At the end of the day, 16 year olds are children and are less informed to make impactful decisions that affect everyone, such as selecting MPs and a Prime Minister.

Ingredients

- 500ml cranberry juice

- 1 apple -cored & chopped
- 1 orange -sliced

- Pour cranberry juice & pineapple juice into a large pitcher with ice.
- Tip in chopped pineapple,apple and orange slice, and stir well before serving.

Instructions

Ingredients

- 30g butter
- 3tbsp milk
- 1 medium egg
- 2 tbsp light brown soft sugar
- Few drops of vanilla extract
- 4 tbsp plain flour
- 1½ tbsp cocoa powder
- ½ tsp baking powder
- 1 square of dark or milk chocolate & shavings
- Whipped cream
- Mini marshmallows
- 1. Put butter in a large heatproof mug & melt in the microwave for 30 seconds. Add the milk, egg, sugar and vanilla, and mix well.
- 2. Stir in flour, cocoa powder, baking powder and a pinch of salt, until smooth. Then push down a square of dark/milk chocolate into the centre.
- 3. Cook in the microwave for 1½ -2 mins, or until risen and firm to the touch.
- 4. Top with whipped cream, chocolate shavings and marshmallows.

Bridge Builders





Monthly Masterpiece

Yee Soo-Kyung

Yee Soo-Kyung is a contemporary South Korean artist whose work masterfully bridges the gap between tradition and innovation. Her ceramics offer a profound commentary on beauty, imperfection and cycles of life.

This artist is best known for her *Translated Vase* series, a body of work that reimagines the potential of broken ceramics. Using shards from discarded traditional Korean pottery, Yee assembles them into new, sculptural forms. The fragments are joined together with epoxy and finished with gold leaf, reminiscent of kintsugi a japanese art of repairing pottery. Each sculpture is a metaphor for resilience, suggesting even in fragmentation, there is an opportunity for rebirth and transformation.

The luminous gold seams contrast with the earthy tones of the ceramics, evoking a sense of duality between the old and new, fragility and strength.

Yee's work is deeply rooted in physiological concepts like wabi-sabi, the appreciation of imperfections, and impermanence. The Korean cultural ethos of jeong - a deep emotional connection to objects and their histories - is also embodied in her pieces.

The shards she uses in her sculptures are often rejected by traditional potters as failed works, but she reclaims them, giving these "flawed" pieces a second life. Her approach also reflects the interplay between craftsmanship and conceptual art. By elevating materials that are traditionally overlooked, she questions societal definitions of perfection and worth.







Birthstones

I liked it because it had exciting action and lots of intriguing twists. I highly recommend it!



The man named Otto is a movie unsurprisingly about a man named Otto. Although it isn't a new film, as it came out January 2023, I believe it is still a great movie.



Popular Christmas Songs



"Um, excuse me, but what's your name?" I ask, as he picks himself up and holds his presents in his hand.


"Uh... my name is Hayden." The guy answers. It clicks. Hayden, my high-school bully and worst enemy, is staring at me staring at him.

Do not be so stupid to think that








## Children's Rights Day 10th December


