

Views from a latter-day Viking

Mystical Britain

I've talked a lot in these articles about my love of walking and of travelling around this wonderful country we live in.

I also have a love of history, particularly ancient history, and I'm constantly amazed at how many well-preserved relics we have of our ancestors works.

Here's a brief tour of places I've been to that have intrigued and impressed me.



Stonehenge, in Wiltshire. Probably the most famous ancient monument in Britain. No one really knows how the massive rocks were moved into place, especially given the tools that would have been available around 3000 BC. The whole area is littered with ancient archaeology, and it seems to have been an important centre for the people then.


Kit's Coty House – the remains of a long barrow, or burial chamber, built somewhere between 3500 and 2800 BC. This is between Aylesford and Maidstone.



Closer to home, near Trosley Park is the **Coldrum Long Barrow**. This is what is left of a burial chamber, at least 3000 years old.

The most impressive of our ancient monuments has to be the stone circle at Avebury in Wiltshire. It had almost disappeared until Alexander Keiller organised excavations in around the village and Avebury in the 1920's. His team unearthed and re-erected many massive stones and the Avebury circle is now around the village itself. It was built almost 5000 vears ago.

WHY I VOLUNTEER

Mrs Vince - Interview by Editorial Team

Q: Which charities do you volunteer for, and what made you choose these charities?

A: I am the funding and safeguarding officer at Medway Culture Club. I work as a volunteer one Saturday a month along with other teachers, TAs, family and friends from around the Medway area. I chose this Charity because my cousin was involved and she said "just come along and see what you think." I realised in the first session just how important it was. We ensure our young people have a safe space and provide them with a supplementary educational program with a focus on diversity.


Q: What different activities do you do when you volunteer?

A: I have run a few secondary age sessions and have helped organise sessions too. We have done so much in the last year including celebrating the 75th Anniversary of Windrush. We did an art session looking at a local hero, Asquith Xavier, using clay; we made busts and tiles related to his life. We have done science activities, an Arabian Eats cooking session, we have a carnival every summer which mimics Notting Hill and a musical session for Diwali where our young people learnt about it and how to play the Dhol drums.

O: Why do you choose to use your free time in this way?

A : As an educator I have a responsibility to ensure that all children get a well rounded education. Our young people get to experience all sorts of things that they may not get an opportunity to learn at school. It is so good for them to get together and learn about each other and their backgrounds too. We have young people from all sorts of backgrounds from the ages of 5 - 16. I have learnt so much myself, so imagine how lucky those young people are.

Q: You recently won an award. What was that for and what was the ceremony like?

A: We have been finalists now for many awards, including our most recent awards ceremony. We were finalists and our chairperson Camealia managed to get to the final 6 for 'Social Compaginer of the Year' at 'The Multicultural Business and Community Champions Awards.' This was a black tie, red carpet event and we went to support our leader for her outstanding work at MCC. We met lots of famous people including Jay from the Repair shop, Nigel Benn, Linford Christie and my personal favourite Jason Arday. We hope with more publicity to win awards one day!

Mrs Vince: "We are always looking for volunteers/apprentices or teachers that can spare time to come and join us. Of course if you are a young person, you too are welcome to join us for an exciting day that includes a cultural lunch from somewhere in the world!
